Snow job

Cold front surprises forecasters

If Wednesday and Thursday's snow took you by surprise, you were in good company. While you were shoveling out from under a record-breaking 7-10 inches of the wet, white stuff, National Weather Service officials were explaining the freak cold air system that hung over Puget Sound longer than expected and helped in part to dump the heavy layer of snow here.

The weather service reports that as of yesterday morning, anywhere from 7 inches to 2 feet of snow had fallen in Western Washington. That breaks a one-day record for March snowfall set locally in 1951. On March 8 that year 5.6 inches of snow was measured at Sea-Tac International Airport. The airport had 7 inches Thursday morning.

A cold air system coming down from Canada's Fraser Valley was expected to pass quickly through the area, said Lee Krogh, a hydrologist with the weather service. Coupled with a warm blast of overriding moist air, that system created perfect conditions to "keep it snowing and snowing and snowing."

It looks nice, but if you're not fond of the snow, fear not. Warmer temperatures and rain are expected Saturday and Sunday and they should effectively wash away the snow cover, Krogh said.

TEMPERATURES today are expected to peak in the mid-30s, but return to below freezing tonight, creating more ice and hazardous driving conditions. The same weather conditions Wednesday night created slush, compact snow and black ice in most parts of the county and the Washington State Patrol has been advising people to stay home if they can.

People in Federal Way have taken that advice to heart, and snowy roads have kept many people home and traffic lighter than normal. Few accidents were reported locally, said Sgt. Mike Meeks of Precinct 5 (Federal Way). He said a few cars slid off the road but no serious accidents had been reported as of yesterday morning.

The state patrol has been somewhat busier. Yesterday morning they were so busy officers did not have time to compile accident tallies.

Puget Power officials report three major power outages in the Federal Way area that left at least 400 homes without electricity Wednesday night and Thursday morning, predominately in areas south of South 320th Street. Other smaller outages were scattered all over the area, said Donna Simon, company spokeswoman.

The snow also closed Federal Way schools and Federal Way District Court yesterday and postponed the Federal Way Community Council meeting until March

16. Many of the mall merchants closed early, shutting their doors at 4:00 p.m.

PARENT ARE advised to listen to local radio stations today to find out if they should send their children to school.

Fire District 39 officials reported no unusual or serious snow-related incidents, but the department offered some advice to keep it that way.

It advised people using kerosene and space heaters for added warmth not to leave the heaters unattended, and

to make sure they are free and clear of walls, furniture and other combustibles. He also said it's wise to check chimneys for creosote.

And, in response to the February cold snap that lasted a week and created ideal but deadly sledding conditions on public streets, authorities are reminding people to sled and inner tube only in parks, on private property and other safe places. Five children and young adults were killed in sledding and inner tubing accidents last month.

District sets schedule for school plans

Delores Gibbons compares public meetings about school boundary changes to the Fourth of July — both can be explosive.

"We find that there are pockets (of parents) who are satisfied and some pockets who are real emotional," said Gibbons, Federal Way's assistant superintendent for elementary education.

So in the wake of proposed districtwide elementary-school boundary changes expected to be unveiled April 3, three special public meetings will be scheduled so parents can ask questions and make comments. In addition, the Federal Way School Board will study the boundary changes at two regular meetings before approving or dismissing them, probably at a May 22 meeting, with public comment allowed at all three board meetings.

A tentative schedule, presented this week to the school board, includes a dozen things the school district will do to get ready for next year's expected influx of 400 new students. The tentative schedule includes:

• March 13 to 24 — Federal Way students will vote on names

suggested by the public for the district's new elementary school, to be built at 13th Avenue Southwest and Southwest 325th Place in West Campus and open by fall 1990. Gibbons said she has not peeked at the entries, but has a stack at least 3 inches tall. According to district guidelines, suggestions were limited to names of local lakes or characters and events from children's literature.

• March 15 — School district administrators will examine special programs, such as the Gifted and Talented Education (GATE) and special education classes, that will be included in the new school. "We want to put them at our top priority, rather than simply locate a school where there's space," Gibbons said.

• March 20 to 31 — Applicants for the principalship of Sunnycrest Elementary School will be screened March 20, 21 and 22, and those that make the cut will be interviewed the rest of the month. Sunnycrest's present principal, Mary Pachek, was recently picked to be principal of the new West Campus

Police go to school to ward off trouble

A second beating administered at or near Decatur High School by suspected gang members from out of town has prompted police to at least temporarily put a uniformed officer on campus.

Maj. Ollie Moore, Precinct 5 (Federal Way) commander, has promised an officer will be available to patrol the campus as long as the school district requests one. One was scheduled to be on campus yesterday and today, but cancelled classes postponed the patrol until the snowy weather clears up.

School officials have asked several youths from outside the Federal Way area to leave the Decatur campus in the past three weeks and two fights involving some of those youths have been reported, prompting worries about the spread of gang activities here.

THE MOST recent attack occurred Tuesday, when two youths who are not Decatur students attacked another youth, who also turned out not to be a Decatur student, said Ron

Sensenbach, director of security for the school district.

A student witnessed the assault, but by the time school officials arrived on the scene all three combatants had disappeared. The victim later was identified, Sensenbach said, and discovered to be from outside the district.

A Decatur student was walking home from school when he was attacked and beaten Feb. 8 by a group of four to six youths who other students identified as being from Tacoma.

Incidents of trespassing by youths have been reported at Federal Way High School and Sacajawea Junior High, as well, Sensenbach said, but to date, Decatur has had the most problems. Because of the increase in unwelcome visitors, school security also has put one of its officers at Decatur full-time, he added.

THE COUNTY officer will wander around school grounds and be on the lookout for youths who don't belong there, identify

Cityhood supporters raise \$14,500

The pro-incorporation group Federal Way First! has raised about \$14,500 for its campaign, according to records the group filed with the state Public Disclosure Commission.

Most of that money has come from more than 100 contributors in amounts of \$50 to \$100. However, there have been some larger contributions as well.

Local developer Andrew Cratsenberg Sr. donated \$1,000 to the non-profit cityhood group. Quadrant Corp. donated \$500 and Virginia Mason South donated \$200.

The group also raised about \$1,300 at a campaign fundraiser at the newly reopened Dynasties Restaurant. Incorporation supporters paid \$22.50 to \$25 a plate

at the fundraiser on Feb. 19.

Most of that money has gone to pay printing bills for fliers and pamphlets that the group has mailed to the 26,241 registered voters eligible to vote in the incorporation election. Ballots for the vote-by-mail election were sent out Monday and are due back to the county by March 14.

MORE MONEY has also gone for ads supporting incorporation in local newspapers. A small amount has gone for yard signs.

Federal Way First! so far has raised less money than other pro-incorporation groups raised in both 1985 and 1981. In 1985, supporters raised about \$19,000 and in 1981 they raised about \$30,000, according to Federal

Way First! Treasurer John Metcalf, who has also been active in past campaigns.

The group has raised less money, but it's also probably needed less money this time around, said Jim Handmacher, Federal Way First! legal counsel. This incorporation campaign has been more low key than in the past, he said.

However, the King County Council's decision to hold a vote-by-mail election did change Federal Way First!'s strategy and the group launched a last-minute push to get more mailings out to voters.

But now that most voters have already received their ballots, "The campaign is practically over," said Handmacher.

MOST PEOPLE will probably

vote by the beginning of next week, according to county projections. Based on past vote-by-mail elections, about 50 percent of voters return their ballots to the county in five days. Another 20 percent will come in the next 10 days and the last 30 percent will arrive within a day after the election's March 14 closing date.

Handmacher emphasized that Federal Way First! is still looking for money to make sure its bills are covered.

Federal Way First! has about 25 core members and another 240 people working in precincts telephoning voters to lobby for incorporation.

Its officers are: Maryann Mitchell, chairperson; Jim Hand-


Real-life story of school is inspiring

Had the Rev. Jesse Jackson elected education instead of the educator for his career, producer Norman Twain would have had two Joe Clarks to choose from when he made his drama-documentary, "Lean on Me."

Fortunately for Twain, if not the education profession, there is only one Joe Clark. Clark, principal of New Jersey's Eastside High School, gained national attention and the praise of former President Ronald Reagan for turning the school from a drug-infested cauldron of violence into a place of learning in less than a year.

Like Jackson, the principal electrifies audiences when he speaks. When Clark (Morgan Freeman) speaks — bellows actually — you hold your breath so nothing distracts from his next verbal punch. The punches come so fast it's possible that

some viewers will end up suffocated on theater floors.

Twain got the idea for the film about Eastside's transformation after seeing a television news segment on Clark in 1986.

The producer was attracted by the man's energy and drive, which is apparent in the energy-charged film.

THE PARTNERSHIP between Joe "Call me Batman" Clark and Eastside High School began in 1967, when the school was one of the tops in the country. By all estimations, he was an enthusiastic and effective teacher, dressed in hippy clothes and passionate about education.

But he was also an agitator, and ended up getting "sent down" to the elementary school level for 20 years.

Flash forward to 1987, when the school has deteriorated. Enter Clark's old friend and school district superintendent, Dr. Frank Napier (Robert "Benson" Guillaume). The state has threatened to take over Eastside if 75 percent of its students can't pass minimum competency tests by the end of the year. The percentage stands at 33.

Clark's transformation is remarkable — he sheds his hippy clothes and his benevolent elementary school principal personality. He marches into Eastside decked out in a white three-piece suit and tie. He bellows at his administration and staff. He yells at students, roughs them up. He expels 300 "incorrigible" students. If teachers don't agree with him, they're out. He chases fire doors closed to keep out drug dealers.

His system works. Throughout the film, you can mark his progress by the painting on the walls. Janitors troupe through the graffiti-covered halls with fresh paint. From where they've been repainted to where they haven't, the walls tell their own story.

BUT CLARK gains enemies along the way. The fire-door chaining stunt ultimately lands the film's climactic ending.

Playing the Clark role must have been draining for Freeman — the character never lets up. When Twain first approached Clark about the possibility of a film, the principal told the filmmaker to be in his office at 6 a.m. That's starting time everyday for Clark.

The "Call me Batman" quote comes from the symbolism he drew from the Louisville Slugger he waved on the cover of

"Time" magazine. Students can either strike out or they can hit a homerun, he believes.

"Lean on Me" isn't about suspense — Clark wouldn't be a national hero if he failed — it's about what the principal will do next. It's an exhilarating experience. By the time the movie ends, you want to wreak the kind of havoc on naysayers that pre-Clark students wreaked on each other.

"Lean on Me" is rated "PG-13" and is now playing at Gateway Cinema.

Finnish choir to sing with local orchestra

The Federal Way Philharmonic Orchestra will depart from its season program for the honor of performing with the Handel Choir of Tampere, Finland at 7 p.m. tomorrow.

Making its North American debut, the choir will perform at the Gethsemane Lutheran Church in Seattle as part of the Finnish community's participation in Washington's centennial celebration. The choir and orchestra will perform Handel's "Messiah Oratorio."

The choir has performed with most of Finland's noted orchestras and has toured Europe performing the "Messiah" and other classics. In February, Brian Davenport, conductor of the Federal Way Philharmonic, traveled to Tampere to conduct the choir in its last performance before leaving on its current West Coast tour.

Tickets for the performance are \$7 and will be available at the door of the church, located at Ninth Avenue and Stewart Street.

will join with the City Cantabile Choir and the Seattle Mime Theatre for performances of Carl Orff's "Carmina Burana" at the Plymouth Congregational Church in Seattle.


No EIS needed for 232 apartments

King County officials have determined that the construction of 232 apartment units at 2136 S. 260th St. does not require preparation of an environmental impact statement (EIS).

The project is known as Springwood Manor and consists of 232 units built in 25 buildings on about 20 acres. The site is crossed by Smith Creek.

The developers, Centron of Bellevue, will have to mitigate development by constructing grass-lined swales for biofiltration of storm water runoff. They also will have to comply with state Department of Transportation recommendations for traffic control.

The county's decision may be

macher, legal counsel; Rep. Jean Marie Brough (R-30th), legislative counsel; Metcalf, treasurer; Linda Kochmar, secretary; Jeanne Burbidge, volunteer coordinator; and James Burbidge, fund-raising manager.

On the other side of the fence, opponents have not organized themselves under state guidelines and haven't filed any

reports with the Public Disclosure Commission because they haven't been active in fund-raising.

Citizens Against Incorporation did file with the Public Disclosure Commission in 1985 but not this year.

Jack Ringler, a leader of the group, said the group currently has a core membership of about 25 people. Ringler was also an active cityhood foe in 1985. He is a retired Boeing engineer who lives near Steel Lake.

CITIZENS Against Incorporation haven't officially organized under state guidelines because they haven't spent any money and haven't raised any, Ringler said. The group didn't raise any money because they didn't plan to distribute any written literature, he said.

"I think people have already made up their minds," Ringler said.

Despite raising no money, the group still has been active with members speaking against in-

corporation at public forums. Vern Benson, who identified himself as a leader of Citizens Against Incorporation at a Jan. 10 public forum, now says the group does not exist in any official sense.

Benson does, however, remain a cityhood opponent. Benson said he is a retired U.S. Army lieutenant colonel who now works as a transportation consultant. Benson lives east of Interstate 5, outside of the proposed city limits.

Incorporation ballots returning to county

Most of the ballots for Federal Way's incorporation election should already have reached Federal Way's 26,241 registered voters.

In fact, by Wednesday, more than 100 ballots from Federal Way and other proposed incorporation areas had been mailed back to the King County Records and Election Division.

The vote-by-mail election process is explained in a voter's pamphlet included with the ballots, but some residents apparently are confused by just how to punch the ballot card.

One resident said he was confused by the inclusion of a page in the pamphlet that includes the legal description of the proposed incorporation boundaries. According to state law, the pamphlet must include the legal description.

Confused voter Bob Wilson

said he thinks including the description is a deliberate attempt by the county to sabotage the election. All people really need to know, Wilson said, is to line up their ballot with the numbers one and three on the back page of the ballot and punch out the number one if they're for incorporation and the number three if they're against incorporation.

The King County Records and Elections Division had two other calls from confused voters by Wednesday. Those voters said they thought the arrows pointing to where the ballot card should be lined up meant for them to turn the page to vote.

Not so, said Bob Bruce, elections superintendent. Once again, the arrows mean that the voter should line up the pamphlet with the numbered ballot card. The arrows are not exactly to scale, though. If you're for in-

corporation, punch out the paper chip next to the number one on the ballot card. If you're against incorporation, punch out the paper chip next to the number three.

If voters have any questions, they can call the elections department at 296-1560. That number is included in the voter's pamphlet.

"We'll be happy to walk them through it," Bruce said.

The instructions for mailing the ballot back to the county are also explained at length in the voter's pamphlet.

Returned ballots must be postmarked no later than midnight March 14. If you haven't received your ballot yet, and are a registered voter, contact the elections division.

If you haven't registered to vote yet, it's too late.

Office rezoning doesn't need EIS

King County officials say the rezoning of land on the north side of South 348th Street and 500 feet east of First Avenue South does not require preparation of an environmental impact statement.

The owner of the property, Sylvia Pan, is proposing that about 16,000 square feet be rezoned from a multi-family zone of 1,800 square feet of lot area per unit to multi-family

zone with 900 square feet of lot area per unit.

A home and garage on the property will be razed and a medical-dental building will be built.

The county's decision may be appealed until March 8. For information on appealing, call the county at 296-6662. Refer to the project by its file number, 206-89-R.

elementary school.

• March 27 — The Federal Way School Board will choose the name of the new school. They will be supplied with the top 10 names chosen by a special citizens subcommittee, and will be advised about the students' top choices, said Gibbons.

• April 3 — District administrators and operators of a new district computer will unveil various elementary-school boundary changes drawn up by the computer based on information fed to it by the district. Boundary changes not only will tap students from schools such as Panther Lake and Lake Grove for the new school, but will likely affect students throughout the district. The computer will offer several options for districtwide changes, which will help balance enrollment at local schools.

• April 3 to 21 — A district boundary committee and representatives of several school-related groups, such as the PTA, will be invited to as-

review the boundary options. Three public meetings also will be scheduled.

• April 10 — Mary Pachek will leave Sunnycrest and take over the duties at her new school. A new principal for Sunnycrest may have been chosen by this time. If not, an interim principal will step in until one is hired. Although the new school will not be built until 1990, Pachek will oversee early plans for the building and will hire the staff. Students and staff of the new school will join for classes at Mark Twain Elementary, 2450 S. Star Lake Road, during the 1989-90 school year.

• April 24 — The school board will be formally presented with information about proposed boundary changes. Public comment is invited.

• May 8 — The board is tentatively scheduled to discuss boundary changes again, and public comment also is invited.

• May 22 — The school board is scheduled to choose a boundary plan for the district.

• May 23 — Mary Pachek will begin planning the coming year with her students and their parents, including the boundary changes.

them if they're found and deter violence, Moore said.

Principal Duane Hammil welcomes the police.

"I think it's OK for a while," Hammil said. "We are trying to make a statement that nonstudents who are going to cause problems here are not welcome."

Hammil also noted that he would rather police presence was not needed, but he concurs with Sensenbach and Moore who view the move as a pro-active one, to prevent problems.

One parent also welcomes a

police presence.

"It's kind of sad that in our society we have to get back to that, but my son knew one of the kids who was shot in Kent, and I take that (gang) threat seriously," said Vaughn Hoffman, Decatur Booster Club co-president. He and his wife, Connie, who is the other co-president, have a son at Decatur and a daughter who will be there in two years.

Hoffman said he supports Hammil's message to youths from off-campus who come looking for trouble. "I would rather see them hump on this thing right now and make sure it doesn't get any worse," he said.

Spiritual touchdowns are Seahawk's top goal

Kyle Kemp doesn't want to be a football player when he grows up. He wants to operate earth-moving equipment.

For any 4-year-old boy, Kyle's dream might sound normal, but Kyle comes from a family where football is, well, a big deal.

Kyle's father, Jeff Kemp, is a quarterback for the Seattle Seahawks. His grandfather, Jack Kemp, is a former NFL quarterback and U.S. Congressman who is now Secretary of Housing and Urban Development. Kyle's uncle is in college on a football scholarship.

Jeff Kemp laughs when his son reveals his earth-moving dreams. Though Kyle's career goals probably couldn't be less cemented, when the time does come for him to select his own path, he will have all the freedom his father enjoyed from his parents. Jeff Kemp probably wouldn't mind it, though, if Kyle used his freedom to follow his dad and granddad into football.

Jeff Kemp explains that while he was raised in a Christian household, being Christian didn't fit in with his image in high school.

"I wanted to be a Christian, but I didn't want to appear to be a Christian," Kemp said.

HE LIKENED his posture to sitting on a fence. By the time he got to college, he was more interested in playing football, his fraternity and his social life than he was in God. After he graduated from Dartmouth College in 1981, however, he realized that he had let God out of his life. He made a decision to recommit himself during that summer.

He said he renewed his commitment shortly before beginning to play for the Los Angeles Rams, who drafted him out of college. It wasn't an easy thing to do, he recalled during a recent interview in his Redmond home.

"I was afraid it would cramp my style," he said. The commitment, however, didn't break. The role God plays in his life continues to grow now, almost eight years later.

KEMP CITES three significant factors that contributed to his new commitment.

First, several Christian players on the Rams formed a Bible study group. That group made up his first circle of Christian friends since high school.

Second, Kemp met his future wife, Stacy, who makes God the top priority in her life. With that sort of woman, Kemp said, he knew he could build a strong family. The two married and now have two sons, Kyle and his little brother, Kory, 1½.

The third thing was his realization that although he was playing in the professional league, God's plan did not include superstardom. He had to put something other than football at the center of his life.

Kemp started pro ball as a fourth-string quarterback, and progressed to third, second and starting positions before falling back to second, moving up to first again, then falling back to second, and now, down to third string.

THE GAME changes so much, Kemp said, that if you made it the center of your life, you'd go crazy. Positions on a team are tentative and Kemp has been traded twice — first to San Francisco and then to the Seattle Seahawks.

Being traded, he said, is a weird feeling.

"Magnify how it feels to have a cop turn his lights on behind you by 10,000..." he said.

Of all the years he's played, Kemp believes last year was the hardest. Starting quarterback Dave Krieg was hurt in the third game of the year, which meant Kemp started in the fourth.

He hoped it would mark the beginning of something BIG. Things didn't turn out that way.

"I was awful," he said with a grimace.

He ended up being benched most of the season and anticipates starting this year's season as number three as well. The team will be under particularly strong pressure to perform well with a new owner and general manager this year, he thinks.

Like the Rams, the Seahawks have a Bible study group, which consists of about nine players.

"There's some real committed believers on the team," he said. Stacy is organizing a Bible study group for players' wives.

The groups are particularly important during the football season, when there's little time to participate in formal church programs.

THE KEMPS are affiliated with a Baptist church, but say they aren't really concerned about denominations. Kemp just wants a church that follows the Bible.

When he isn't playing football, Kemp works at Pro Athlete's

Outreach, a partnership of professional athletes and businessmen who provide leadership training to athletes. Their goal, he said, is to teach athletes in all sports to be worthy of the respect people put in them.

The group, which is Christian, sends athletes to talk to kids and

at clinics. Both Kemp and his wife also are active in the Olive Crest Treatment Centers for Abused Children.

God, he believes, has made him a steward — of talent, of his kids, of assets — and it's his responsibility to use those things to help others.







Eagles' foes pull a snow show

Weather will dictate new game time

The Federal Way girls' basketball team braved the unexpected snow storm Wednesday night for a West Central District semifinal game at Clover Park only to discover that its opponent didn't.

While all three of the other West Central District girls' games that were scheduled took place, the Federal Way-Kennedy game was cancelled when the Lancers pulled a no show.

"It got so bad at 7:30 last night, they shut the airport down," explained Kennedy girls' basketball coach Paul Muckerheide. "The Burien area got so bad to have the kids going down there to the game. There was no way Kennedy could make that game."

Meanwhile, Federal Way players and parents, referees and reportedly even some Kennedy fans did travel to Clover Park in Tacoma.

"We've got some very upset parents right now," said Federal Way coach Chuck Czubin.

Czubin said that because of the weather conditions, the West Central District may decide to not play any remaining games that are not significant for seeding purposes to state.

But the Federal Way-Kennedy game must be played, said Bud Hatley, executive secretary of the WCD.


"We're going to try for tomorrow (Friday)," said Hatley Thursday morning.

TENTATIVE PLANS are to play the game tonight or tomorrow, depending on weather conditions, at a neutral site closer to Federal Way and Kennedy. The exact location and time of the game was not known at press time.

Port Angeles, Puyallup, Kent-Meridian and Auburn along with Federal Way and Kennedy have all locked up berths to the state tournament, which begins Wednesday in Seattle.

Auburn has sewn up either a No. 1 or No. 2 WCD seed to state by virtue of its 63-34 win over Port Angeles in the other semifinal game played Wednesday night at Foss High School.

If Kennedy and Federal Way do not play until Saturday, the winner of that game and Auburn likely will be named co-champions of the WCD. The co-champs will then flip a coin to

determine the first and second seeds to state.

The No. 1 and No. 2 district seeds get better draws for the state tournament, Hatley said,

while the third, fourth, fifth and sixth seeds are "thrown into a pot. It doesn't make any difference whether they play or not."

Tacoma Tigers to debut against Oakland

The most exciting home opener in the history of Tacoma baseball will highlight the 30th anniversary of Pacific Coast League baseball in Tacoma on April 19, when the defending American League champion Oakland Athletics play an exhibition game against the Tacoma Tigers.

"I couldn't think of a better way to open our 30th anniversary season than with the A's," commented Stan Naccarato, the Tigers' president and general manager. "Our fans will have an opportunity to see the best of the American League, many of

whom are alumni of Tacoma and entertained our fans at Cheney Stadium in the past few seasons."

The Tigers and Athletics will hook up in a 7:35 p.m. exhibition game that will open a 73-game schedule for Tacoma. The Tigers open the 1989 PCL season in Phoenix on April 6 and play a 12-day road trip before returning to Tacoma for the home opener. Tacoma will face Phoenix, Tucson and Las Vegas in four-game sets on the opening swing.

The official PCL opener at Cheney Stadium is scheduled for

Thursday, April 20 against the Albuquerque Dukes. The Tigers will be home for 12 days on the opening homestand, playing 13 games, including the A's exhibition.

The Tacoma franchise will turn 30 years old in 1989, having competed in the PCL since 1960, when the San Francisco Giants had their Triple-A affiliate in the Pacific Northwest. The Giants stayed until 1965, moving their operation to Phoenix in 1966, where they have been ever since.

The Chicago Cubs moved into Tacoma in 1966 and also played

for six seasons, capturing the 1969 PCL championship under Whitey Lockman. Lockman managed in Tacoma for four seasons before moving on to the majors.

IN 1972, when baseball was set to move out of Tacoma, 20 local businessmen, led by Naccarato, saved the franchise from leaving and have now operated the club for the last 17 years.

Under local ownership, Tacoma has been affiliated with the Minnesota Twins (1972-77), New York Yankees (1978), Cleveland Indians (1979-80) and presently the Oakland Athletics.

Games were chance to live dreams

Terry Jackson said he felt like he was competing in the Olympics at the Washington Centennial Games last weekend, and with good reason. For many of the 1,800 athletes, including Jackson, it was the biggest event of their sporting lives.

For a few days, anyway, they tasted the kind of glory normally found in Seoul and Sarajevo, not Wenatchee and Chelan.

And if the other athletes feel anything like Jackson, they relished the opportunity Jackson, who played football and basketball and ran track while going to Thomas Jefferson High School, competed in boxing.

Although it had been about six or seven years since he had put on a pair of gloves, Jackson made a New Year's resolution to get back into the ring. And that's where he's been ever since Jan. 2.

The 21-year-old Twin Lakes resident, who suffered an injury to his big left toe in a lawn mower accident in 1981 that temporarily put his ring career on hold, visited the Al Davies Boxing Club out of the Tacoma Boys' Club, the same gym that produced Olympic boxer Sugar Ray Seales, and it took only one day for him to catch the fighting spirit once again.

"There's something about contact that really turns my stomach real good," said Jackson, who captured a silver medal in the recent Centennial Games in the 132-pound weight class after losing by decision to Port Orchard's Jonah Dean.

Inspired by the Centennial Games, Jackson hopes to reach the Olympic Trials someday and have a chance to represent his country in the Olympic Games. Although he is a little inexperienced now, he thinks he has the tools to make such a giant dream come true.

His immediate goal is to make an impact in amateur boxing. By next season, "I think I'll be a fighter to beat," he said. "This is the climbing year for me and the climbing seems to be going well. All I can do is try and go out 110 percent."

Jackson wanted to make sure everybody knew he was from Federal Way at the Centennial Games, even though he boxes out of Tacoma.

He wore a black and orange American Legion baseball cap with the letters, "FW," on it just so other people would know where he was from. He wore it so proudly that he was asked to take it off during the opening ceremonies.

"I may be fighting out of Tacoma, but I'm from Federal Way and I don't want Federal Way to be ignored," he said.

It's doubtful Jackson's opponent ignored him, especially after he landed a left to his jaw midway

through their three-round bout.

"I caught him in the middle of the second," he said. "I kind of stunned him. I was the first southpaw he'd ever fought. He was the favorite going into the tournament."

Jackson, although five years older than Dean, was giving up several inches in reach.

"I fought a guy who was 6-1, 6-1 1/4," said the 5-7 1/4 Jackson. "It was really a shock. I was 21 and he was only 16. I didn't expect him to be physically tough, but mentally he was well-prepared. His dad was his coach and that gave him a boost."

Jackson had to rely on himself for a boost, although he did have his coach and fellow boxers from Tacoma rooting him on. Jackson is in good company at the Tacoma Boys' Club. He calls his coach, Tom Mustin, the "best amateur coach in the world." And he also is inspired by such standouts as Rodney Hughes, Paul Vaden and Emmett Linton, all three national champions who have made it to the Olympic Trials.

Jackson and Dean were the only two in the 132-pound weight class, as Centennial Games organizers did not accept every possible entry for boxing. Also, 15 boxers got sick and had to drop out while others were involved in an automobile accident.

The hardest part about fighting in the Centennial Games was waiting for his match. Although he arrived in Wenatchee Thursday evening for opening ceremonies and weighed in Friday morning, his match with Dean didn't take place until Saturday night at the same time as the Bruno-Tyson fight. He didn't get to see that fight on HBO because he was in the ring.

Jackson is just 0-2 in the ring since coming back to boxing, but 11-4 for his lifetime. He hopes to get another chance to fight Dean again during a Golden Gloves tournament in Tacoma March 10-11.

"It's something that I'll never forget," he said. "If I'm never able to participate in a World Games, at least I was able to participate in the Centennial Games in Washington."

Judo duo grabs gold

A number of local athletes fared exceptionally well during the Washington Centennial Games recently held in the greater Wenatchee area.

Highlighting local performances in judo was the effort of brother and sister Michael and Melody Barnes of Federal Way.

Michael captured a gold medal in the boys' (13-15) under 150 pounds division, while his sister Melody also took home a gold medal in the girls' (16-18) under 120-pound division.

Lisa Pizl, who trains at Gymnastics Unlimited in Federal Way but lives in Orting, claimed a gold medal in the all-around senior women (15 and over) division in gymnastics with a score of 37.9.

A silver medal in boxing was won by Terry Jackson of

Federal Way in the 132-pound division.

Also winning a silver medal was Federal Way's Ron Ewing in handball as he teamed with Renton's Tad Eversole in master doubles competition.

In weightlifting, Matt McCann took a silver in the 123.2-pound division, as did Mike Church in the 181.5-pound division.

In men's gymnastics, Cliff Jones took a silver in the men's class II vault with an 8.8. He also won a bronze in the men's class II rings event with a 6.6.

And Chris Hossfeld of Federal Way won a bronze in the men's class II pommel horse.

Gary O'Malley of Federal Way just missed a bronze medal as he and Tacoma's Annis Upshur took fourth in the mixed doubles pickleball action.

Local boot team seeks third crown

Weather permitting, the Federal Way Star Shooters will play the F.E. Lions from Vancouver, Wa., Sunday at Renton Stadium in the girls' under-12 Championship Cup finals.

Game time is set for 12:30 p.m. with the winner earning a berth to the Western Regionals in California in June.

Another local girls' soccer team, the Federal Way Storm, also has a shot at winning a berth to regionals. But the Storm must play a semifinal game tomorrow at 10 a.m. A victory in that game would advance the Storm into the Championship Cup U-14 finals Sunday at Renton Stadium beginning at 2:45 p.m.

But all the soccer action is contingent upon the weather, which already has caused

some problems.

"We may not play this weekend if it doesn't start raining," said Dick Foster of the Federal Way Soccer Association. "You can't play in the snow. Too many chances of injuries."

The Star Shooters, who are coached by Steve Manderville, are shooting for their third straight state title. But this year's championship is more important, considering there is a trip to California on the line.

They were then supposed to play the semifinal game last weekend, but now there are two teams tied in the point system that have to play off with the winner getting a chance to play the Storm in the semifinals.

"I feel like we paid the price," said Baumgardt, whose team outscored its opponents, 25-1, in four preliminary playoff games and now is forced to play two games in two days. "But we'll be sitting and waiting."
