## A tame 4th

### Torched fir tree is lone alarming event

The Fourth of July was a pretty safe and sane holiday this year in Federal Way. Except for small brush fires and a fence blaze, celebrations here were nothing to call an insurance agent about.

Oh, except maybe for the blazing tree that was knocked into Lake Dolloff.

It seems that while local fire and police departments were running to the small brush fires and smoldering fence, Chuck Gillett was chopping down a tree.

It was a big tree, though, and it was on fire.

"It looked like a giant candle...It was really pretty impressive," said Jim Francis, owner of the tree.

**THE FLAMING** fir on the lake's edge had been struck by a firework in its uppermost branches, to the consternation of lakeside neighbors as well as Francis, who lives at South 308th Street and Military Road.

The fire might have died out, had the wind not picked up, and

had the tree not been long dead and dry as kindling.

"(Francis) had three buckets of water ready, so they were prepared in case something happened. But no one was prepared to get up in that tree," said Mary Anne Gillett, Chuck Gillett's wife.

The Gilletts were shooting off some of their own fireworks on their lakeside lawn, just about a hundred feet from the flaming tree, when a cry went up for a chainsaw to bring down the fiery foliage.

The Gilletts apparently are the only owners of a working chainsaw on 34th Place South.

"It was great. People kept lighting off fireworks and watching the tree burn, until the chainsaw started. Then the whole place went quiet," said Chuck Gillett.

The burning tree plopped into Lake Dolloff, leaving Gillett with a reputation for creative fire quenching and Francis with a pine pier jutting out into the

## Candidates part ways on growth

Federal Way City Council candidates Mary Gates and Bill Shortt went head to head Thursday in the first of seven chamber of commerce sponsored debates.

The Position 1 candidates, who will face off in the Sept. 19 final election, agreed on many issues such as strong police service and keeping taxes at current levels.

However, the candidates seemed to part ways on perhaps the campaign's most volatile issue: How to control runaway growth in Federal Way.

Responding to questions from a panel of three chamber members, Shortt did not specifically state any support for an all-out moratorium on apartment development. However, he seemed to favor stronger controls on growth than Gates.

"I hope everyone will join together to put the brakes on the kind of building that will cost us a lot of money in the future," Shortt told the audience of about 40 mostly chamber members.

GATES, however, specifically

## Family Fest

### Train club makes tracks for community party

They have real homes and real jobs and they talk about real things like food and gardens and neighbors.

But with Styrofoam paint and some elbow grease, a tiny world of imagination is at their fingertips.

Modifying reality to make illusions is the magic of the Puget Sound N-Scale Train Club, a loose-knit organization of miniature-train enthusiasts, says Federal Way resident Peter Sanchez.

And Sanchez should know. He once adorned a hand-made flange car, the part of the train that clears snow off the tracks, with a tiny chain found in a sewer while on duty for the Southwest Suburban Sewer District.

"I disinfected the thing, and now there it is," said Sanchez, pointing out the chain draped across the car, as if recently used by a tiny train operator.

Trains, tracks and landscape, most handmade by members of the Puget Sound N-Scale Train Club, will be one of several displays set up at Family Fest, a free Centennial celebration at Steel Lake Park this weekend.

Along with free afternoon performances by acoustic musicians Eric Tingstad and Nancy Rumbel on Saturday (3 p.m.)

and children's entertainers Tickle Tune Typhoon on Sunday (3 p.m.), the fest will feature food booths, a soccer challenge and exhibits by various local organizations, such as dog-obedience trainers and windsurfers.

Although the Puget Sound N-

Scale Train Club regularly shows off its best at area train and hobby shows, the 19-by-11-foot working display to be shown at Family Fest is the smallest the club has put together, and the first to be shown outdoors.

## Needle makes fowl point

A lot of birds will be thanking Harold Wilson this winter.

The Federal Way News "Weird Stuff" search, dedicated to highlighting loony local landmarks, thought Wilson's miniature Space Needle fit the bill.

The Space Needle, a birthday present for Wilson's wife, Shirley, isn't just for show. It's an aviary. "Yeah, it's a two-story duplex," said Shirley Wilson. "A condo. Let's be fancy."

The genesis of the needle replica began in Wisconsin, of all places. Harold's father, who saw the original at the 1962 World's Fair in Seattle, liked it so much he built his own.

When he died, Harold and Shirley had hoped they could bring the little needle back to its home state. But other relatives had already claimed it. Shirley was disappointed.

But Harold told her not to worry. "(He) says, 'I'll build you one,'" said Shirley.

So Harold, recently retired from the state highway department, and a builder of impeccable model boats, went to work. "(It) took a month," he said. "Took me a while to figure it out. I built it from a picture."

Even though he'd told Shirley he'd build her one, she was shocked when Harold took her out to the garage last October. "He had it laying here," she said. "I couldn't believe it."

She said they "had a hard time getting it up," but when it

## Dynamic duo Pair plays new tunes

Eric Tingstad was tired of rock music. He was bored, too, with the seemingly passionless technical expertise displayed by the current crop of classical virtuosos.

So the Seattle native turned his classically-trained guitar to different pursuits. "Everything's getting so technical these days. I wanted music that was a little bit more accessible and compassionate," he said.

Together with his partner, oboist Nancy Rumbel, Tingstad will give a free performance at the Federal Way Family Fest at 3 p.m. tomorrow at Steel Lake Park. Their performance is sponsored by Washington Mutual Savings Bank.

Tingstad describes his music as "new acoustic," which is closely allied with "new age" music. For those who don't know, "new age" is a philosophy that embraces the environment and the self. Its best-known proponent is actress Shirley MacLaine.

"(It's) music that goes with a little bit older crowd, from 30 and up," said Tingstad, 33. "It's music that actually sings to their hearts a bit more."

TINGSTAD was quick to assure audiences that the music he and Rumbel play is "not all meditative and mellow. It runs the gamut of emotions."

Searching for a comparable musician to give Family Fest audiences some idea of what to expect, Tingstad came up with pianist George Winston. He said he recorded and toured with Winston, and that he and Rumbel share Winston's goal of

"trying to make music that feels good."

Music is a full-time occupation for Tingstad. "This is a real job," he said. "I work from 9 (a.m.) to 11 (p.m.) just on music, writing, recording and performing."

Rumbel could not be reached for comment, but the duo met in the early '80s, and knew of each other before they met, due to mutual awareness of the music scene, said Tingstad.

They have collaborated on four albums. The latest is called "Legends," and the duo will perform selections from it at Family Fest.

"LEGENDS" uses legendary stories as its inspiration, focusing on figures in history like Sacajawea, Don Juan, Galileo and Johnny Appleseed. Tingstad said he was influenced by the book "The Hero Within," by Carol Pearson, which discusses personal heroism.

He lists Rubinstein and Heifetz among his personal heroes as far as music goes, and learned Segovia's technique (named for classical guitarist Andres Segovia) at Western Washington University in Bellingham.

The duo is not just locally based. "We tour all over the country," said Tingstad. They have performed in Europe and Japan as well. Their Christmas album, "The Gift," is one of the biggest sellers in the holiday music genre.

Acoustic new age music is

"the fastest growing genre of the '80s," said Tingstad. With such committed performers as its spearheads, it's no wonder.

Besides Tingstad and Rumbel, the Family Fest, which takes place this weekend at Steel Lake Park, features a kaleidoscope of free entertainment and activities.

The event, organized under the auspices of the Federal Way Centennial Committee, kicks off at 10 a.m. Saturday morning. Heather and Carolee Ostrom will sing the national anthem and other historical songs, accompanied by keyboardist Gary Verrill.

Sunshine Generation, a children's troupe, will perform at 11 a.m., followed by the Sea-Tac Harmony Kings barbershop chorus at noon.

Other performers include the Gymnastics Unlimited dance team, "Hagen's Heroes" (a division of the Federal Way Community Band), Dance Unlimited's Pazazz, and the Federal Way rock band, Legend.

Tickle Tune Typhoon, a popular Northwest children's entertainment group, headlines Sunday's entertainment. Their show begins at 3 p.m. Les Beigel's Dixieland Dandies also will perform.

The Family Fest also will include numerous booths, demonstrations, and of course, food. For more information, call 838-8620.

### At the Movies

#### "BATMAN"

Devotees of the Dark Knight will have minor quibbles with Tim Burton's vision of the Caped Crusader, but not many. Though he's too gadget-oriented and not much of an athlete, this Batman is the grim creator of the night envisioned by his creator, Bob Kane. The effects are tremendous, and rescue a mediocre plot, freighted by a forced and unnecessary love story. Michael Keaton brings an interesting quirkiness to Batman's character. There may be too much of Jack Nicholson's Joker, but so what? He's brilliant. Rated PG. Playing at Sea-Tac North and South.

#### "FIELD OF DREAMS"

A baseball fairy tale in the general mold of "The Natural," but more contemporary and less about baseball than about one man's struggle to come to terms with bittersweet memories of his father. Based on the novel "Shoeless Joe," the movie is faithful to the book in spirit if not every detail. Warm, witty, with bursts of visual splendor, such as the eerie initial appearance of the "ghost" of Shoeless Joe Jackson in a baseball diamond carved from a corn field by the famed star, Kevin Costner. It's a movie with a message: Follow your dream and you might get a second chance. Tender hearts should bring Kleenex. Rated PG. Playing at Sea-Tac North.

#### "GHOSTBUSTERS II"


Sequels are tricky things. It's possible to make good ones, but "Ghostbusters II" is just a dismal rehash about the team of ghost exterminators fighting evil. The original film was funny because it was fresh, irreverent and posed no real life-threatening danger. When you take that fun away and try to be really scary, as "Ghostbusters II" does, the comedy dies. What's astonishing is that talented, funny people like Dan Aykroyd, Harold Ramis, Bill Murray and director Ivan Reitman managed to make a movie without a single new idea. It's a slimy mess of old jokes and an indigestible touchy-feely ending. Ptooey. "Ghostbusters II" is rated PG and is playing at Gateway Center and Lewis and Clark.

#### "INDIANA JONES AND THE LAST CRUSADE"

"Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade" won't disappoint devotees of the George Lucas/Steven Spielberg hero. The inimitable Indy (Harrison Ford) gets tangled up with Nazis, religious fanatics, and his own father (Sean Connery) while searching for the legendary Holy Grail. The plot is thin, the action predictable and the suspense non-existent, but the stunts are routinely breath taking, and Connery adds some spice to the formula mix. Rated PG-13. "Indiana Jones" is playing at Sea-Tac North and South and at Southcenter.

#### "STAR TREK V: THE FINAL FRONTIER"

"Star Trek V" may be one of the best sequels out this year. Better than "Rocky" or "Friday the 13th," the fifth "Star Trek" sequel is as comfortable as an old pair of sneakers. In this latest installment, the Enterprise is commanded by a renegade Vulcan named Sybok (Laurence Luckinbill), who does things

We don't associate with Mr. Spock's race, like smiling. The plot begins on an epic scale, but peters out. But fans of Captain Kirk (William Shatner) and Mr. Spock (Leonard Nimoy) and the rest of the Enterprise crew won't be disappointed. Who cares about an untidy plot when there are Klingons to fight? "Star Trek" is rated PG and is playing at Sea-Tac South and Lewis and Clark.

# Forty films fill summertime void

The roughly 20 years each of us spends in the educational system sets our responses to summer. What has this got to do with renting videotapes? In the summer, one tends to go for the most pandering cassette packages, regardless of plot, dialogue and characterizations.

The movies listed alphabetically here are not all drive-in wonders; some are even art-house faves that just look, er, different with your brain turned off during the summer months.

**"Alligator"** (Lightning, 1980) — A little girl flushes a baby gator down the pipes; 20 years later it's chewing up sewer workers.

**"Assault of the Killer Bimbos"** (Urban Classics, 1988) — This one's directed by a woman, so the title bimbi are accorded respect.

**"Beat the Devil"** (RCA/Columbia, 1953) — This stars Humphrey Bogart; the joke is, there's no plot.

**"Better Off Dead"** (Key, 1985) — This is a genuinely funny movie, graced with John Cusack in his snidest role and Diane Franklin as a French exchange student.

**"Blood Beach"** (Media, 1981) — A rubber monster preys on unsuspecting bathers.

**"Breathless"** (Vestron, 1983) — Jean-Luc Godard says he wants to colorize his original, so until then watch this remake, which is dum-dum California cool.

**"Cherry 2000"** (Orion, 1983) — Melanie Griffith plays a futuristic bounty hunter who helps a wimp find a replacement for his rare sex robot.

## New Age thinking is spiritual detour

The New Age movement is strong and growing even stronger in the Pacific Northwest. What exactly is the New Age, and why are so many people interested in it?

Essentially, New Age thinking encourages freedom of belief. This is different, though, from the freedom to believe. The New Age movement is an eclectic philosophy of life, blending Eastern religion and mysticism with Western psychology and science. The result is a conglomeration of ideas and practices manifested in many ways, from Saturday morning cartoons to university curricula.

The bottom line to New Age theory is that God is the universe, and since we are a part of the universe, each one of us is a part of God. The problems we face in life, as individuals and as a human race, stem from the basic idea that we are not realizing our own potential as God.

There are many expressions of New Age thinking popping up in the most popular ways. The human potential movement is a big one. Many forms of self-help and self-fulfillment embrace the New Age mentality: biofeedback, yoga, astrology, meditation, ESP, music, some forms of counseling and therapy, and even the medical field.

On the religious end of the spectrum, there is reincarnation, spirit guides, occult practices and channeling. Ramtha is an alleged 35,000-year-old spirit warrior who manifests himself through J.Z. Knight of Yelm. The New Agers call that channeling. I call that demon possession.

The New Age's smorgasbord of beliefs and practices stem from an attitude of "freedom of belief." A goal of the movement is to focus on the areas of agreement among the world's life-oriented philosophies and blend them together to form a one-world system of belief: the New Age. Through personal and private enhancement, the world itself will be enhanced.

But what about this idea of uniting the world through personal progression and productivity? Is there any danger to the philosophy of self-improvement for the sake of the world, or is the New Age onto something that we should be wary of?

The ultimate end of private enhancement is godhood. Only God the creator is perfect. There is no one like him. "For I am God, and there is no other, I am God, and there is no one like me (Isaiah 46:9)."

It was Lucifer (Satan) himself who once said, "I will make myself like the Most High"

(Isaiah 14:14). The Lord rejected that statement of "self improvement" and cast Lucifer out of heaven, and condemned him to hell where he will someday spend eternity.

After his fall from heaven, Satan came to Eve, tempting her with the same basic, selfish desire, saying, "You will be like God (Genesis 3:5)." Eve believed that her actions (eating the forbidden fruit) were the key to ultimate enlightenment — that she herself could be like God himself. But she very quickly and painfully found that she had been deceived. The serpent lied to her, and both she and her husband Adam took the bait, hook, line and sinker.

Satan's strategy for deceiving the human race through the seduction of superiority did not stop in the garden, though. Even today, the thought of attaining godhood appeals to millions. But are those thoughts right?

There is nothing wrong with personal improvement. But self-improvement that excludes God, or blends him into the universe as an impersonal cosmic force is wrong. Dethroning God by elevating man eliminates his standards for life, salvation by grace through faith in Jesus Christ alone, right and wrong, black and white, heaven and hell, good and evil. The list goes on...

The New Age Movement is a satanically inspired break from God and all that he stands for, all that he is. It is a subtle and alluring detour from the timeless standard of God's book, the Bible, and even God himself. New Agers believe that neither God nor the Bible is sufficient to bring meaning to life, and are blindly following the path of Satanism, masked in the veneer of humanism. Those of us who understand that God ought to be the ones proclaiming its relevancy to life today.

## Troubled kids trust chaplain

"We reach into a lonely place and offer a message of hope."

### Youth Chaplaincy Program pamphlet

The soft-featured, pretty young woman sits at a steel table in a sparsely furnished recreation area at King County's youth detention facility.

Her memories go back to when she was 3 years old, left alone to fend for herself on the streets of a foreign nation.

She came to Seattle at age 12, but within a year she left her adoptive family and found her way back to the streets. She survived through prostitution and petty crimes.

HER STRIKINGLY handsome 17-year-old boyfriend sits beside her. He has been in and out of trouble since the age of 15. Once he nearly killed a boy in a knife fight.

His mother "just disap-

peared" years ago and he, like the young woman, has been looking for answers ever since.

Now, both believe they have found their answer. And it came from the last place either expected — a chaplain named Terrie Ward.

Ward is the director of the Youth Chaplaincy Program at the youth detention facility in Seattle, where both young people recently spent time while awaiting trial.

SHE HAS A gift, she says. She listens and she accepts, and there are no strings attached.

"She is different from anyone in the system," says the young woman, who asked not to be identified.

"I was so scared to talk to her, but when she came (to my unit), she just told me to take a deep

breath, and then she gave me a hug."

At that time, the girl faced trial for kidnapping her baby, who had been taken away from her.

"She didn't force me to tell her anything, but I felt like I could. I felt like she would really listen," she said.

NEITHER YOUTH has a background that encourages trusting. The young woman had been "beaten up and abused by men and women" since the age of 3.

The young man, who also does not want to be identified, says he saw all relationships as power struggles, which he was determined to win.

But the soft-spoken chaplain exudes a quiet strength of her own, one which more and more

kids at the youth facility are beginning to value and to trust.

Harold Delia, director of King County's Department of Youth Services, says word travels fast among kids, and "the word apparently is good, because the number of kids seeking her out is growing everyday. And I mean seriously troubled kids — gang members, murderers, badly abused youngsters.

"SHE IS A refuge for kids who have no one else," he adds. Ward is not an ordained minister, but she holds a masters degree in theology and has 20 years' experience working



# Police redistrict to track service

To keep better track of calls for service within the new boundaries of the city of Federal Way, local police have redistricted the precinct's service area.

Maj. Ollie Moore, Precinct 5 commander, said the change to 10 districts from six will help police keep track of the number of calls dispatched for service within the incorporation area. That information will be used to develop a contract proposal for police services with the new city.

Instead of six "George" districts, Federal Way has seven "Ocean" and three "John" Districts. The Ocean districts are within the city's boundaries and the John districts are in unincorporated

### King County.

Precinct 4 has realigned its districts because the new city of Sea-Tac, which lies within its boundaries, will likely contract for police services as well.

# Chandler drops in briefly

Congressman Rod Chandler is urging business owners to write and voice their opposition to a complicated and costly law regarding compliance with health-care plans.

Chandler (R-8th), was speaking to the Federal Way Chamber of Commerce Wednesday at its monthly luncheon. The law, which requires businesses who use tax-favored health plans to submit reports of compliance with government regulations, is unwieldy and expensive, he said.

Chandler is urging businesses to let Congress know how they feel about the law, titled Section 89, by calling or writing and demanding a repeal.

"Then we might be assured of a reasonable reform," he said.

To prove compliance, some companies, such as Weyerhaeuser, spent roughly \$2

million to collect the necessary data. Smaller businesses have had to hire consultants and spend inordinant amounts to furnish the proper information, he said.

Chandler also chided environmentalists for not supporting a recent compromise for the harvesting of old-growth timber in Washington and Oregon.

At the center of the controversy is the spotted owl, which nests in old-growth timber. The timber industry wants to start logging more old-growth trees, but environmentalists have blocked their paths.

Chandler called environmentalists' rejection of the compromise, "selfish." He added that the owl deserves protection, but so too do those who depend on the timber industry for their livelihoods.

# Vessel finally finds home

A decrepit barge that parked itself on Redondo beach last April finally has found a place where it will be appreciated.

The barge was towed off to a wildlife sanctuary on Jetty Island, near Everett, late Monday night. It was beached there with several other derelict barges already on the island, and will serve as a home to birds and sea creatures, said a representative of the Army Corps of Engineers.

The 200-ton abandoned barge drifted onto the south end of Redondo beach in mid-April at

high tide, and was left high and dry when the tide receded. The Army Corps of Engineers made one aborted attempt to remove the barge in June, but it wasn't until this week that a towing company was able to drag the old vessel away.

The barge had no distinguishing marks and so could not be identified, but Redondo residents say it did have a distinct smell because of the sea critters that had already dug out homes in its sides.

# Stolen motorcycle recovered in chase

A police officer stopping a motorcyclist for having no protective eyewear had to chase the man through a state park before capturing him.

King County police report an officer stopped the 20-year-old Des Moines man shortly before 7 p.m. Tuesday for having no protective eyewear, as required by law. The officer said in his report that he asked the man for identification and the man responded that he had none.

When the officer asked the man to turn off the motorcycle, he instead accelerated and drove away. The report said the rider sped through Saltwater State Park, swerving around pedestrians and vehicles, before striking the curbing near the entrance and spilling his bike.

# Police apprehend suicidal woman

King County police apprehended a woman who was standing on a highway overpass and talking about killing herself.

Responding to a call about the woman, a police officer found her Monday afternoon standing on the overpass in an unnamed part of Federal Way. She told the officer she was thinking about suicide.

The officer asked the 27-year-old woman to sit in his patrol car and talk about her problems, but

she refused and told him she wanted to be left alone. She added that her problems "will be over soon."

She was taken to Harborview Medical Center by ambulance for involuntary commitment.

To add insult to injury, a restaurant patron's first made fun of another patron's speech problem, then assaulted him.

Police reports state a 21-year-old Federal Way man was eating at the Woodmont Denny's at 2:40 a.m. Monday when another customer at a different table began teasing him about a speech problem. The two men exchanged words, and the instigator walked over and punched the other man in the face.

Reports state the man stopped punching the victim when a restaurant employee threatened to call police. But before he left, the man returned to the other man's table, mashed a ham-

burger into his face and slammed his head to the table, causing him to hit and break a glass with the side of his head. The victim suffered a gash to the head from the broken glass.

Restaurant employees said the assailant then paid for his and a companion's meal and left. One employee followed the two into the parking lot to get a license plate number, and another gave police the name on the credit card the man used to pay for his meal.

Police are investigating, and the punching victim was taken to Auburn General Hospital for treatment of the cut to his head.

Most model fans in America, some 72 percent of them, according to model merchants, collect HO trains, larger at 1/87th the size of a working train. A few fans go for even more varied sizes, on down to the teensy-weensy Z-scale

trains. Few solid figures are available about the fandom for tiny trains, but Model Railroaders, a national magazine for collectors, boasts a circulation of more than 200,000.

Many get interested the way Sanchez did — by getting an HO-scale train set for Christmas as a young child. What he loved then and still loves now is the command he was given over this

tiny train world.

"You're in control of this fantasy world...Even when there was no scenery, just an oval track and a train, I had this vast coast-to-coast system running through my living room, and I was in charge," he said.

N-SCALE TRAINS took centerstage when he joined the Navy and found he couldn't fit the larger HO-scale trains in his barracks. Now, he says, he'll never go back to the larger models.

Several club members will link tracks Saturday for the Family Fest show. The display will include a switchhouse and three N-scale trains rounding every bend. Club members won't be there just to show off their skills, Sanchez says.

"The more people get into N-scaling, the more products will be available and the less expensive they'll become," he said. "We want people to get excited about this."

"I was going to cut it down a piece at a time eventually, but we've changed that plan a bit," Francis said.

Fire District 39 (Federal Way) had been alerted when the tree went up, but was called off when the flames were doused in the lake.

ALL TOLD, the fire department responded to 21 calls on the Fourth of July, down even from

last year's 35 calls. And just about every fire was quenched or burnt out by the time the fire department arrived, said Ed Coutts, fire marshal of Fire District 39.

Coutts says an emphasis patrol by firefighters, which concentrated watch in areas with past firework problems, and recent wet weather probably worked together to keep the holiday quiet.

The Fourth of July was calm

even at St. Francis Community Hospital, where no fireworks-related injuries were reported.

"Last night was the quietest night all week," Kathy Callahan, director of coordinating services at the hospital, said Wednesday. "We had only four emergencies, and none of those from fireworks."

The Federal Way precinct of the King County police likewise knew of no holiday-inspired misbehavior. No fireworks incidents were reported for the

Fourth of July as of Wednesday afternoon, although several mailboxes were sent skyward last week in pre-holiday explosions.

Coutts cautions local residents, however, that many fireworks fans still possess untorched pyrotechnics, and that the weather is expected to be good and dry in the coming week.

"The season's not over yet," he said.

# Group Health proposes apartment rezone

Group Health is proceeding with a request to rezone 11 acres near its South 320th Street clinic so the property can eventually be developed into a 190-unit apartment complex.

The Federal Way Community Council opposes the rezoning because of the effect the apartments would have on traffic and schools.

Currently, the property is zoned for high-density multi-family housing, but only for senior citizens, or for medical offices. If the King County Council approves the rezoning, multi-family housing aimed at any age group will be allowed.

A rezoning hearing is scheduled for 1:30 p.m., July 27, at Building and Land Development Division (BALD) headquarters in Bellevue.

Group Health doesn't plan to develop the property itself, according to Don Glickstein, Group Health spokesman. It would like to sell the property to Bellevue developer Continental-Pacific Inc. However, it will get more money for the property if it can sell it zoned for multi-family without the senior citizen limitation.

FEDERAL WAY doesn't have a profitable senior housing market, according to Group Health officials.

Continental-Pacific already has plans to construct 190 townhouses and apartments on

the site which is just south of the clinic. Those 190 units are far less than 300 units that would be allowed under the existing zoning, Glickstein said.

"With this plan, there would be fewer units in the project than if you built senior housing," Glickstein said. "The site is already surrounded by multi-family housing. We feel the Continental-Pacific proposal is a reasonable one."

Group Health and developers brought their proposal to the Federal Way Community Council last January. Council members surveyed neighboring residents and after examining the proposal decided to oppose it, said Bob Roper, council member and the chair of the council's land-use committee at that time.

"Because of the road standards...you would have to improve the intersection (at South 320th Street and Pacific Highway South) or scale back the project," Roper said. "That intersection can't even be improved anymore."

AFTER researching the site, Roper found the same site had been rezoned from single-family to multi-family three years ago at Group Health's request. The understanding at that time was that the property would only be used for senior housing, Roper said.

Group Health bought the land

15 years ago, planning to build a larger clinic than the one the health cooperative currently operates next to the site. However, economic conditions, including the construction of St. Francis Community Hospital, caused the company to change its mind, Glickstein said.

The site is now surplus land for Group Health, Glickstein said, and will be sold. The 190-unit apartment development is more beneficial than many other projects, he said.

"It's a development that's sensitive to the community," he said.

The course features earthen mounds, tree-lined fairways and yards of bunkers and water hazards. Green fees for guests are \$42. Non-guests can play for \$45.

**Salishan**  
One of the most popular Northwest resorts, whether you golf or not, is Salishan on the Oregon Coast. But if you golf, it's just that much better.

Salishan is at Gleneden Beach, about 20 miles north of Newport. The resort features 201 rooms adjacent to the resort's main lodge, each with a fireplace and view balcony. Rooms are \$118 per night. The resort has four restaurants, including a wine cellar with 1,000 labels.

stated her opposition to a moratorium on multi-family housing, but agreed that the effects of too much development have hurt traffic and are overcrowding Federal Way schools.

"I don't want us to go out and pursue multi-family (development)," she said. But, "Moratoriums result in spiking. People go crazy to get everything built right before a moratorium and then go crazy right after one before there's another."

"People would scream if we had no growth."

Gates also said the one-year

wait developers must endure to get their building permits approved by the King County Building and Land Development Division (BALD) is far too long and the new city should work to shorten that wait.

"I hope Mary is right that speeding up permits will make better buildings," rebutted a skeptical Shortt.

The new city can respond to growth by fighting to preserve open space, Gates said.

Gates pointed to her experience as a member of the Wetlands of West Hylebos, a group that helped to make the Hylebos Wetlands into a state park, as proof of her commitment to open space.

Shortt did not outline a posi-

tion on open space.

"By the time the campaign is over I will have an initiative on parks," he said.

Shortt trailed Gates in the May 16 primary election by 2,975 to 1,684.

Gates, 45, has lived in Federal Way for 15 years. She has been a management training consultant for 20 years and has taught at several area colleges. She is married and has two children.

Shortt, 56, has lived in Federal Way for 22 years. He is a part-time marketing and economics consultant and formerly was president of Shortt Saw and Knife Company and Tool Distributors Inc. He is married with five children.

feet curb-to-curb. There are curbs and gutters along both sides, and a sidewalk along the south side of the existing road. A new sidewalk will be added to the other side of the widened road. About 11,500 square feet (1/4 acre) of new right-of-way will need to be acquired to make the proposed improvements. This project will supplement the current accesses to the park and ride lot at 23rd Avenue S. and the south-bound I-5 off ramp. 25th Avenue S. is now a local access road for businesses located just south of S. 320th Street.

**Location of Proposal:** 25th Avenue S. between S. 320th Street and the Federal Way park and ride lot. Northeast 1/4 Section 16, Township 21 North, Range 4 East, W.M.

**Proponent and Lead Agency:** King County Department of Public Works.

The lead agency for this proposal has determined that it does not have a probable significant adverse impact on the environment. An environmental impact statement (EIS) is not required under RCW 43.21C.030(2)(c). This decision was made after review of a completed environmental checklist and other information on file with the lead agency. This information is available to the public on request.

This determination of nonsignificance is issued under WAC 197-11-340(2); the lead agency will not act on this proposal until after July 14, 1989.

Comments must be submitted by July 14, 1989.



The letter should identify you and how you can be reached. Any Notice of Appeal for this determination of nonsignificance must be received no later than July 14, 1989.

You should be prepared to make specific factual objections.
