Council favors Feb. 28 birthday

The Federal Way City Council has chosen Feb. 28 as the community's official incorporation date for a variety of reasons that were discussed at a council workshop Wednesday.

The primary reason is that Feb. 28 is as late as the city can go and still collect sales taxes and other state shared revenues in 1990. The council gave first reading to an ordinance Tuesday that would enact city collection of a sales tax of 1 percent, the maximum allowed by state law.

Enacting the sales tax won't raise taxes. Instead, that 1 percent will go to the city, not the county, which currently collects the tax. The overall 8.1 percent sales tax in King County will remain the same.

Also, incorporation on Feb. 28 allows the council enough time to put the issue of fire service up for election. The council has not yet decided which method to use to provide fire service to city residents.

The city can annex into Fire District 39 (Federal Way) or the city council can choose to contract with the district. It can also create its own fire department, although that option is extremely unlikely. Annexation requires an election.

The Federal Way City Council will hold a special meeting at 7 p.m. Tuesday to take a final vote on enacting the collection of the city's share of the sales tax.

The city will begin collecting the tax effective March 1. Usually, the council's Tuesday meeting would be a study session, but the council wants to vote on the sales tax as soon as possible to make sure it notifies the state of its intention to collect the tax by the Dec. 1 deadline.

The council will have its usual study session after the special meeting.

The council will meet with King County Public Works officials at 7 p.m. Wednesday to discuss the transfer of road construction funds from the Southwest 312th Street widening project to the 16th Avenue South widening project.

This food is fit for a felon

Inmate meal costs 62 cents

More than 1,500 men and women are likely to spend Christmas Day behind bars at the King County Jail.

It will be a day like most in the

lockup — endless, boring, embittering.

But even in jail, Christmas Day should be different. And, in one respect, it is. On that day, inmates are served special meals, for breakfast, lunch, and dinner.

CHRISTMAS MORNING starts out with their favorite — Fruit Loops cereal. The meal also offers scrambled eggs, turkey ham, and a "giant cinnamon roll," but jail food service workers say that Fruit Loops are the big hit.

For Christmas Dinner, it's turkey

and dressing, gravy and mashed potatoes, cranberry sauce, and pumpkin pie with whipped cream. The ambiance may not be top-drawer, but the cuisine would suit a family dinner table.

But Christmas Day is a once-a-year exception. The other 364 days, meals in the Graybar Hotel are simple, basic institutional food.

"We don't get fancy here. We're not running a gourmet operation," says Richard Higginbotham, food services supervisor.

Surprisingly, few inmates com-

plained about the food when asked by a reporter. But they did grumble about the amounts they are served.

IN THE TANK they call it "Ethiopian food," because it's barely enough to keep you alive," says David, a 32-year-old Seattle man serving time on drug-related charges.

Kevin, 22, also in jail on drug charges, says he "went to sleep hungry every night," until he

Scammer caught returning to well

Going back to the well once too often resulted in the arrest of a woman who had posed as a new employee at two local stores and stole money from the tills as she was being trained.

It was a fairly simple scam, say Precinct 5 (Federal Way) detectives who followed up on the cases. The woman merely filled out applications with her real name, but with a false address and false references.

At the AM-PM market on South 320th Street and Military Road South, the 27-year-old woman palmed money from the cash register as she was being trained. She then returned to the store on two other occasions, told the cashiers she was a new hire and needed more ex-

perience. The cashiers allowed her to run the till and each time came up short at the end of their shifts.

In all, the woman is suspected of taking \$410 over three days from that store between Nov. 2 and 4.

A new hire at Northshore Exxon at Southwest 336th and 21st Avenue Southwest was watching a training film Monday while another employee was filling out a bank deposit. That employee left the room for a moment and came back to find the new hire gone — along with \$520.

Police reports say the new hire, who gave the same name and fit the description of the new hire at the AM-PM market, told

The lesson was that there is a sweetness in surviving. Years of comfort kill the taste of it. A regular paycheck may smother it. The threat of deprivation revives it.


Just in time for Christmas. We hope they will think of that this holiday, and recalling the chilly moments in that shadow, will feel some kinship with those who can't escape it.



do, he said.

I get the hint. Without griping, I take the table cloth into his downstairs bathroom,

where I painstakingly remove the stains. Every few minutes, members of the family poke their heads in to ask if I do shirts, too. My brother leaps in and shoots a bunch of Polaroids.

I heard later he was selling them for a buck apiece, upstairs, under the title, *Betsy Ross' Brother Cleans Rough Draft of Flag*.

When I finished scrubbing, I went back upstairs to visit the only friend I had, the left-over turkey. In the kitchen, it gaped at me from the roasting pan. My family sat around the dining table, eating pumpkin pie and snickering in my direction.

I was not about to give them the satisfaction of making rude remarks about that photo. So I sliced a hunk of pie, shot it with whipped cream and went over to the kids' table. My own kids were just finishing. They left, along with my oldest nephew, to play Nintendo in the bedroom.

I sat across from my three-year-old nephew. He was shoveling pumpkin into his face like a guy operating a backhoe. As I watched him, I figured he would understand how it felt to be picked on by your brother.

"They were tough on me today," I said. He never looked up.

"So what?" he said. "Don't expect me to feel sorry for you."

"Why not?" I asked.

"I used to be messy like you," he said.

Man leads police on high-speed chase

A 20-year-old Federal Way man led King County and Kent police on a high-speed chase early Tuesday morning after he was spotted stealing signs from Thomas Jefferson High School.

The young man said he was taking a garbage can, TJ signs and a school district parking sign to send to an alumnus friend who now attends the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis.

School district security notified King County police they were following the man, and at South 272nd Street near Military Road, the chase began. The man led police to Reith Road, then State Route 516, hitting speeds of 50 to 85 mph.

At State Route 516 and Willis Street in Kent, two Kent police officers joined the chase, which continued on to State Route 167, northbound, at speeds of 90-95 mph.

The man left the highway at 84th Avenue South and came to a stop in an industrial complex near South 194th Street, with three Kent police cars and one King County car in pursuit.

The young man locked his doors and refused to come out. Police forced a door open and put police dog Thor in the car with the young man. One bite from Thor convinced the driver to leave his car.

Police reports say the young man struggled and resisted officers as he came out of the car, and had to be taken to the ground before he was subdued. He was treated by Fire District 39 aid personnel for bumps, bruises and a dog bite, and booked into the King County Jail for eluding police, a felony.

Police dogs catch fleeing assailant

Police dogs were used Sunday night to track a man accused of assaulting his ex-wife and daughter in a domestic dispute.

Police reports say a divorced couple had been arguing off and on all day and that the 43-year-old ex-husband had assaulted his former wife. Police were called, but the 40-year-old man was gone by the time they arrived.

Police were summoned again Sunday evening when the man returned to his ex-wife's home and the fight resumed. He reportedly hit his daughter when

she tried to intervene. The man fled again, but two police dogs tracked him to a spot just 100 yards away from the apartment complex. Reports say the man hit and kicked one of the dogs, and resisted arrest.

The man's ex-wife was treated for a cut over her eye that required 20 stitches. He was booked into the King County Jail for fourth-degree assault for the fight with his ex, second-degree assault for attacking the police dog, malicious mischief and resisting arrest.

Dumpster diver alarms employees

Police were called to Adelaide Elementary School Monday because a man rummaging through the garbage was upsetting students and employees.

Police arrived at 4:25 p.m. and found the man, leaning into the dumpster, scooping lunch waste into his mouth with his hands. The man, who is mentally handicapped, lives in the neighborhood, but was locked out of his home, police learned.

School officials said the man has been seen eating out of the dumpster on more than one occasion, and recently frightened

the school janitor. The janitor was putting garbage in the dumpster when the man popped up out of the receptacle, startling him.

Police said the man was unable to communicate well, but was cooperative. The reporting officer babysat the man for three hours while his supervisors tried to figure out where to take him. Out of options, police finally told the man to stay in the garage of his home, which was unlocked, until his guardians came home.

started working in the kitchen where he could help himself to extras.

Higginbotham counters that he uses sophisticated computer programs to make sure the meals are nutritious, balanced, and contain adequate calories.

"We're here to meet their nutritional needs, not to fatten them up," he says.

Inmates also complain about being served the same thing over and over. Higginbotham rotates the meals very five weeks, so those doing a longer stretch can use lunch as a calendar.

But David, who's been in and out of the King County Jail for the last 10 years, says the food is much better now than it used to be.

Higginbotham, who was hired

at the jail 18 years ago, agrees.

"WHEN I FIRST started here, it was like slopping hogs," he says.

"They would fill up these huge pots and take them to the day rooms. Then the guards would get out of the way, and let the men dig in.

"It was survival of the fittest," he says, shaking his head in disgust.

Higginbotham can spend only 62 cents per meal, under his current budget. That means no special treats, no steak, no shrimp and no lobster, ever.

But he says he does try to make the food attractive.

"Even people in jail have a right to expect reasonable food. Otherwise you're asking for big-time problems," he says.

INMATES ARE SERVED, 25 at a time, in dayrooms on each floor of the jail. The meals come

in insulated trays, which measure 12 inches by 18 inches, with four separate compartments. They eat with a small, flimsy, plastic combination spoon and fork, a utensil that is almost useless as a weapon.

On an average day, the kitchen prepares 1,600 trays, three times a day, in the overcrowded jail.

Breakfast, which starts as early as 5:30 a.m., is almost always a cold or hot cereal, toast, a piece of fruit, milk and a slice of turkey ham. Lunch is usually a standard such as chili or chipped beef. Dinner is often baked fish or a breaded meat patty, usually pre-cooked and ready to serve when it comes into the jail kitchen.

MEN AND WOMEN are served the same meals, and special diets, religious or vegetarian, are served on request.

Sanitation practices are rigidly adhered to, especially with the inmates who work in the kitchen. During his tenure, Higginbotham says the jail has been free of food-related health problems.

Food is never used to modify behavior or to punish, according to Higginbotham, although he admits the inmates don't get a lot of sweets.

They do, however, get those special meals on Christmas, and Higginbotham is quite proud of the colorfully decorated menu flyers he posts on all the dayroom walls shortly before the holiday, listing the special dishes.

But one inmate sounded a sour note as he walked by a reporter who was looking over the holiday menu.

"Remember," he said, "that may look good, but it's still got to fit on these trays."

Republicans don't like new county budget

Following several days of political wrangling, the King County Council adopted a \$712 million county budget late Wednesday night.

The 1990 spending plan passed by a partisan vote of 5 to 4, with majority Democrats lining up behind the budget and Republicans unanimous in their opposition.

The document goes to Republican County Executive Tim Hill for his approval or veto. He has 10 days to take action, or the budget becomes law.

BUT REPUBLICAN lawmakers say negotiations over the budget are far from complete. They plan to lobby Hill as well as other councilmembers for additions and deletions to the spending package.

Councilman Paul Barden said he will try to find the votes to add 12 more police officers to the county's public safety program.

The \$500,000 appropriation, which was pushed by Barden and Councilman Greg Nickels, went down to defeat in the wan-

ing hours of Wednesday's session, but Barden said it's not dead.

He explained that the new officers are needed to replace the 12 Washington State Patrol cars being pulled out of Federal Way and SeaTac when those two cities incorporate. He said that King County must replace those officers if it plans to contract with the new cities for police services.

"IT'S DIFFICULT to see how the county can be contemplating contracting to provide the same level of police protection the cities have now, when they won't have the manpower to do so," he said.

Even though Barden and other Republicans were not happy with the budget, he would not say whether they will ask Hill for a veto. Hill threatened to veto the budget earlier in the week, but by Wednesday, he seemed more favorable to the spending plan.

Nickels said he was at a loss to explain why Republicans refused to cooperate in approving the

budget. But Barden said they balked because they didn't have all the information they needed.

He accused Democrats of engaging in a "mindless exercise" when they forced passage of the budget late Wednesday night.

"It was done as a show of force in the waning days of their majority," he said.

Republicans will take over the majority on the council when two newly-elected members of the GOP are sworn into office in January. Barden is considering a run for council chairman at that time.

BARDEN ADDED that Republicans on the council may eventually support the Democrats' budget, but not without a thorough review during the coming weeks.

"They (the Democrats) may have set some traps for political reasons, and we'll have to undo those," he said. One potential "trap," according to Barden, is a Democrat plan to dedicate \$7 million to a new low-income housing program. Barden said

that Republicans are concerned that dedicating funds could hurt other county programs.

"They (the Democrats) may have been thinking that they can let the Republicans be the bad guys, if we take away that money next year. That may have been the strategy behind that program," he said.

DESPITE THE wrangling, several new programs survived the budget process with the blessing of all members. Those include a \$500,000 appropriation that could be used as a downpayment on the purchase of the Puget Sound Junior High School site. Community activists are battling to retain the nine-acre parcel for a park. Business interests, however, have offered the Highline School District \$2 million to turn the former school site into a shopping mall.

In addition, \$550,000 was approved for street safety improvements in high traffic areas. The money will pay for crosswalks, traffic lights, reflectors and other safety devices on busy streets, such as South 128th Street and 2nd Avenue South.

Council enacts sales tax collection

setting fire-service parameters.

Under contracting, the city would collect the fire district's property tax and then negotiate a price for service with the district.

Some council members are concerned that the district is understaffed. Fire district commissioners say it's unlikely the city will save money by contracting for fire service.

Interim City Manager Al Locke told the council Wednesday he favors annexation because expenses would stay the same if the fire district collects its own tax revenues and continues to manage fire service.

The council will also discuss library service at its Tuesday meeting. The city can annex into the King County Library System or can contract with the county for library service. Locke recommended the city do nothing in 1990 so library service will continue with the county as it currently is. The council can decide to annex or contract later if it chooses.

The council decided not to incorporate before Feb. 28 because that means it can still collect sales and real estate excise taxes, but can save money by continuing to receive county services, such as police service, without having to pay extra for

them. KING COUNTY will continue to provide services until Federal Way incorporates. After incorporation, the city must contract for services, although the county must provide police protection and road maintenance for up to 60 days after incorporation at no charge.

Locke told the council it would be prudent to wait until the last possible moment to incorporate, and still receive state shared revenues, because the city is expected to have a tight budget.

According to revenue projections recently presented to the council by a consultant, the city should have enough money to operate, but should be careful.

Assuming Federal Way incorporates on Feb. 28, the city would collect about \$4.3 million in diverted road district property taxes in 1990. The road district tax currently is collected by King County at a rate of \$1.84 per \$1,000 of assessed property value.

It would also receive about \$3.4 million in sales taxes and \$497,000 in real estate excise taxes, according to projections by consultant Mike Mulcahy.

It would collect about \$2.5 million in other state shared revenues such as fuel and liquor taxes.

The city will not levy any new taxes in 1990. Without levying new taxes, city revenue should almost equal expenditures by the end of 1992. However, those estimates are tentative, Mulcahy stated in a report to the council.

"These projections are very sensitive to a number of assumptions and could easily swing by \$1 million to the good or bad if different assumptions are used," he stated. "Therefore, the city should endeavor to adjust the budget to provide for an ending fund

balance of between \$500,000 and \$1 million at the end of 1992."

The council may also need to issue councilmanic bonds, which are bonds that councils can issue without the approval of voters and which are repaid by existing city revenues.

The council is expected to begin work soon on putting together a 1990 budget. Because Federal Way is subject to state laws governing cities in transition from county to local government, that budget doesn't have to be adopted by the city council until Feb. 3.

Lake controls planned

King County will hold two meetings to inform residents of proposed drainage improvements to both Lake Dolloff and Lake Geneva.

The meeting on the Lake Geneva improvements will be at 7 p.m., Tuesday, at Lakeland Elementary School, 35675 32nd Ave. S.

The meeting on the Lake Dolloff improvements will be 7 p.m., Thursday, at Kilo Junior High School, 4400 S. 300th St.

The improvements are being

proposed for both lakes to solve runoff from lakes during flooding. The runoff is causing erosion.

Options for improving the lakes as runoff storage facilities include increasing lake storage or installing flow bypass pipes.

The meetings will include presentations by county staff on those options and a question-and-answer session.

Name change sent back

A petition to change the name of Federal Way will be sent back to organizers of the name-change movement.

A group of about 100 residents submitted petitions to the Federal Way City Council in October asking that Federal Way residents vote on whether to keep the name Federal Way.

The earliest that election could be held would be in November 1991, according to state law.

The city council asked its legal counsel, John Wallace, to

look into what the council should do with the petitions. Legally, the council has no choice but to pass the request along to the King County Elections Division to put on the ballot once Federal Way is incorporated.

However, Wallace said the city council doesn't have to do that yet because Federal Way isn't officially incorporated.

The petitions will go back to organizers who may resubmit the request after incorporation.

Bloodmobile to visit

Should Mark Twain Elementary start again?

Star Lake parents say yes, but school board will decide

It only makes sense to neighbors on South Star Lake Road, that Mark Twain Elementary School should be open to their children next year.

"It seems kind of silly not to send our children there," said Adam Green, resident of the Redondo Crest housing development, only yards away from the entrance to Mark Twain.

But the fate of the 20-year-old school, which will be decided tomorrow by the Federal Way School Board at its regular Monday night meeting, is not so simple.

Mark Twain was built in the late '60s with the open concept, meaning it has no walls between its classrooms. It was closed in 1975 for lack of students and school district funds.

The school has since been used to temporarily house students and staff of other schools under construction, but has not been a school in its own right since it was closed.

BUT APARTMENTS and housing developments have sprung up around the school since 1975, and children of those homes have been sent to Star Lake Elementary School down the road.

And now Star Lake is nearly bursting at the seams, with five classrooms from its 700-plus student population now housed at nearby Totem Junior High.

Mark Twain may be just the relief Star Lake needs.

"Parents seem anxious that it be opened because of the size of this school," said Don Swanson, principal of Star Lake Elementary. "They look at the 140 students now at Totem Junior High and say, 'It's time to do

something.'"

IF THE SCHOOL does take on its own students next year, however, some complications arise. Mark Twain has been listed as a secondary school on state records. As an elementary school, it would count as elementary space in the district, and could jeopardize state matching funds for construction of new elementary schools here.

Mark Twain also needs some renovation. The school's tiny playground, shaved smaller by the South 272nd Street on-ramp to Interstate 5, is cracked by tree roots and time. Temporary walls still separate classrooms.

But even with all that, plus the hiring of a new principal and staff, the public seems to approve of reopening the school to alleviate overcrowding.

JUDY WALL, communications director for the school district, said parents at recent community meetings have urged district administrators to reopen the school.

"At least, nobody's spoken against it. Everybody wants relief," she said.

At the Redondo Crest housing development, across the street from Mark Twain, the results of an informal poll were unanimous: Reopen Mark Twain.

Parents said they would worry less about their children in traffic, and maybe would have fewer worries about boundary changes that would take their children from one school to another.

"How much more convenient could a school be?" asked Ginny Stephens, mother of 7-year-old and 12-year-old sons.

"It would be a plus if the children don't have to ride the bus. Star Lake is quite a ways away," said Ron Clark.

Those were not the only considerations.

"My husband went to Mark

Twain when he was a kid. Now our kids might go there. Boy, that would be weird," said Cindi Kjellesvic.

As close as Redondo Crest is to Mark Twain, there is no guarantee children from that

housing development would be enrolled there. If the school board chooses to reopen the school, boundary lines would not be drawn until January or February.

Board meets tomorrow night at school district headquarters, 31405 18th Ave. S. The meeting will begin at 7 p.m., and will be held in the district's Board Room. For information, call 941-0100.

a clerk she wasn't feeling well and had to leave.

Management at Northshore Exxon on Tuesday called the woman (the phone number on her application wasn't bogus), and asked her why she hadn't come back to work, inviting her to return. When she arrived for work, she was detained for police.

The woman, who lives in Des Moines, told detectives she

learned the scam from her boyfriend. She said she initially stole to pay his debts, and the only reason she returned twice to the AM-PM market was because he sent her back, saying she hadn't stolen enough to repay a debt to his grandmother, said Detective Paul Mahlum.

She said she continued the scam because her boyfriend left her, pregnant and without money. She also admitted to stealing \$75 from a Des Moines convenience store, which police

are trying to confirm.

Police urge prospective employers to thoroughly check the information on job applications. In this instance, a check would have shown that the woman's address was bad and the business for which she claimed to work does not exist, said Detective Jim Corey.

That information, plus Social Security numbers and other background information, should be checked before an applicant is hired, he said.

The woman was booked into King County Jail for investigation of second-degree theft and was released pending the filing of charges.



They're not too tall, But they have a ball

Fun is net result for Munchkins

About the same time "Wheel of Fortune" burst onto TV sets across Federal Way, the exchange of parents and children in the Panther Lake Elementary School gym had begun.

A father followed his flushed, sweating daughter across the polished floor, his hands clutching a bouquet of Barbie dolls. They met up with families surging in and out of the gym's double doors.

One Munchkin basketball team trooped in for practice, another trooped out.

At the foul-line, a boy in black high-tops tugged the closest adult.

"I have to do good, 'cause my stepdad's coming today," he announced, hopping up and down for emphasis.

A free-throw away, Carl Kilpatrick folded his 6-foot-10-inch frame floorward and outlined the finer points of coaching Munchkin basketball.

"You've got to look in the corridor sometimes, and out in the bathrooms for the kids," he said, eyeing the team that was now scattering onto the court. "And you never hold practice for more than an hour, or you lose their attention. Plus, you've got to get them home in time for bed."

THIS WASN'T necessarily what Kilpatrick aspired to as a short-time pro for the Utah Jazz basketball team in the 1979-80 season and later as a player in various foreign countries.

"But that was a fantasy, being in basketball," he says now. Reality for Kilpatrick is working for a national refrigerator corporation and raising three children with his wife, Valerie. And reality is living in Federal Way, where the seeds of Kilpatrick's same fantasy may be sown in children through the fertile field of Munchkin basketball.

Few if any of the 122 first-, second- and third-graders from local schools now signed up for the Federal Way Boys' and Girls' Club's youngest Munchkin basketball program will sprout into world-class players. Even at this young age, their bodies bespeak of budding CPAs and Boeing executives.

Kilpatrick's own daughter, Coty, is a lanky, able player for the team, the Panther Lake Bullets. But even she is a hesitant performer.


"We just gotta get you a little meaner, huh?" Kilpatrick asked 8-year-old Coty, enveloping her in a bear hug at the same time.

THEORETICALLY, being hard-nosed doesn't matter in Munchkin basketball, a program first introduced here by the Boys' and Girls' Club five years ago. Aggression and competition are downplayed. Free-throws are taken only 12 feet away instead of 15, so even the shortest player has a shot. Quarters are six minutes long, and everybody plays.

This is what would have been street basketball in a safer, less hurried age. It's been civilized by adults, made possible by volunteer coaches and their aides, and made available to children for \$30 for a six-game season.

"When we gonna play?" asked an impatient child, hopping from Nike to Nike.



Kilpatrick was nervous. He, his wife and various Bullet parents had showed the team how to bounce-pass, lay up shots from both sides of the net and dribble around folding chairs. They had enforced strict team rules ("DON'T sit on the BALLS!") and even asked the children to run laps.

And now, Kilpatrick wanted a win.

"I guess I'm not supposed to say that," he said sheepishly.

HE DIDN'T have to worry for long. From the moment referee Brian Hill blew the whistle and the tip-off bounced lamely down the court, the Panther Lake Bullets had things in hand. New maneuvers that never applied in practice came into play — flap like a bird for defense, hop to celebrate a hoop. Skipping was an acceptable move, but leaving the ball behind as you dribbled down the court was not.

Although third-grader Kyle Ulrich is the team's most graceful and highest-scoring member ("One of my stud players," said Kilpatrick), David Searight pulled off the magic trick of that first evening. With seconds to go in the first half, he turned and heaved a half-court shot, good for two. Even the judo class at work on the other half of the Boys' and Girls' Club gym paused to watch the celebration.

"A prayer shot," Kyle would say knowingly, after the game.

The Bullets won this contest, their opening game of the

season, 22 to 2. But then, that's not supposed to matter.

"I suppose it does matter, but that only lasts a few minutes after the game," said opposing coach Bob France, head of the Star Lake Munchkin basketball team. "But they're here for fun and besides, they don't know anything about basketball yet. Two of my players thought it was time to go home after the first half."

THE BULLETS ARE now in their fourth week of the season, with two more games to go. So far, every game has been a victory.

More importantly, the Bullets have developed style — Jason Rucker now steals the ball with the skill of a cat burglar, Nick Briggs hops in celebration of a good shot. Kyle continues to be a "stud" player, and Coty has found the hoop.

Parents still fill the stands, where they chat while keeping an eye on the game. Bruce McCrory came to watch his son, Dustin, in the fourth game.

Bruce McCrory hates to watch basketball.

"But hey, it's my son," he said.

The game-ending buzzer at their latest contest sounded like a shot, startling parents and kids. The Bullets had put another one away, 28 to zip. Another game would be played in the same gym in a few minutes, with two new teams on the court and new sets of fans in the stands.

And the exchange of parents and children began again.







Keep yourself busy with a round of winter trimming

At last it is time to relax. No more lawn mowing or hedge trimming, your bulbs are all planted and the tools stored away for the winter.

If you are restless indoors and need something to do, there's always the winter pruning. Cut out any broken or diseased branches on your trees and shrubs.

If a wind storm or burst of energy with the pruning shears produces some evergreen boughs this week, don't worry that they'll dry out before Christmas. As long as you store your cut evergreens outdoors under a sheet of plastic or inside a garbage sack they'll stay fresh for months.

There are some rather messy evergreen trees that drop their needles as soon as they're brought indoors. Hemlock is one of these temperamental greens.

Avoid using it for interior decorating. Noble fir and cedar boughs will last much longer. Go ahead and stick a wreath of cedar and fir on the outside of your door this weekend. It will stay fresh until after New Year's Day.

Q. I have a large and lovely philodendron house plant. Lately I noticed that the lower leaves are turning yellow and the new leaves at the top of the plant are

a sickly green color with yellow blotches. This is a very large plant and I don't want to lose it. Does it have a disease? I looked close and couldn't find any bugs on the plant.

G.H., Sumner
A. It sounds like a classic case of the winter doldrums to me. The yellowing leaves that appear on houseplants every winter are often signs of stress. The days get shorter and the houseplants get less light. The nights get colder and wood stoves and furnaces get fired up and dry the inside air.

The houseplant stops growing, so it needs less water. The plant

owner, realizing the yellow leaves are a cry for aid, starts to water more in a frantic effort to help. Now the poor plant has to deal with over-watering, low light and lack of humidity.

No wonder many houseplants never make it through the winter. Back off and water less during the winter doldrums. Don't fertilize. Give as much light as possible and add to the home's humidity. You'll both perk up once spring arrives.

Q. Before we order our vegetables for next spring, I was wondering if you could recommend some varieties for our special problem. Our onions and garlic bulbs rot before they ever come up, and our green beans start to rot after they bloom. The beans we do get are spotted. This disease will wipe out whole rows of vegetables, but does not affect corn, tomatoes, squash and cucumbers. We also grow nice potatoes. We have gardened in this spot for 35 years and make all our own compost but don't use any diseased material.

Mrs. J.F., Puyallup
A. You've got a disease problem that is encouraged by cool wet weather and soil that holds too much moisture. Add 2 inches of sand to your soil this spring and till it in well. Now don't plant your garden until late May or early June.

Make sure you have perfect drainage in your raised beds. Beans that resist bacterial blight (I'm guessing from your description that blight disfigured your green beans) are Tendergreen green beans.

An onion that is smut resistant is Texas Early Grano. You can use a fungicide drench on your garlic and onions before you plant them. Don't over-water and hope for a hot dry summer. Write back next fall and let us know if things improved.

Q. I have been trying to transplant young Douglas Fir trees onto my property with lousy luck. When is the best time to transplant these native trees?


No EIS required for 204 townhouses




